In our classrooms, our teachers will work with students and families to support students' success in reading and math.

Math at Home

The following are ideas about how families can support students' success in math.

- Measure items around the house.
- Count objects and abstract ideas like steps.
- Count money and make change.
- While reading recipes, talk aloud about the math in measuring the ingredients.
- Build with blocks, Legos, and complete puzzles.
- Make or use flashcards for math facts (+, -, x) and for number recognition
- Go for a walk and find different numbers to compare or find patterns
- Practice using a calendar: count or skip count days between certain dates; figure out how many (more or less) months, weeks, or days there are between different dates
- Use a deck of cards for: ordering numbers greatest to least, number patterns, or find all the cards that add or subtract to a certain number (for example: combinations of 10)

Reading at Home

The following are ideas about how families can support students' success in reading.

- Read words out loud that are in the everyday world such as menus, road signs, and recipes.
- Read to your child or let them read to you. Talk about the reading: What happened? What did you like best?
- Visit Linebaugh Library for story time or to check out books
- Act out your favorite story
- Story Box: place a random item in a bag or box then have your child tell you a story about the item or write the story down
- Take a nature walk and talk about what you see using details
- Story Chain: One person begins a story with a few sentences, the next person continues the story for a few sentences, continue taking turns until the story is finished
